I. I. A. C. Football Schedules Should Make Selection Simple.

The six football schedules announced by I. I. A. C. teams point toward the belief that 1923 will see the football title holders standing out clearly, with only limited chances for disputes on the claim.

The I. I. A. C. football charts are top heavy with conference games. Millikin meets nine conference teams, Illinois college has eight, with the possibility of adding one more, Augustana has six, Wesleyan eight, and Normal six.

OTHERS WILL FOLLOW.

It is expected that the remaining schools will list possibly as many as those named above.

Lombard appears on the Wesleyan schedule and will no doubt play either Knox or Bradley, possibly both. The Wesleyan schedule has already signed Notre Dame and Washburn and will have a classy schedule.

A BUSY WEEK.

The week was a busy one at Bloomington for I. I. A. C. sport affairs.

Bradley was admitted to membership, the Freshman playing rule was made until another year, it being ruled that the conference was not yet ripe for the change.

BAR TRAINING CAMPS.

Then action was taken against training camps and schools in the future will not be allowed to open football practice until school actually opens in the fall.

Several other important decisions were reached. No more football championships will be awarded. There will be no basketball tournaments.

SCHEDULE PLEASES.

Since the 1922 Millikin schedule was published, the writer has heard considerable discussion regarding it. While some expressed the opinion that at least one, if not two "faster" time games should be scheduled, the majority stated that they were well pleased with the chart.

The feeling seems to prevail that I. I. A. C. afforded plenty of territory for Millikin to step out in and win football honors.

SIKI REFUSES TO MEET COMMITTEE

Says Lawsuit Might Suffer.

Paris, Dec. 9.—Battling Siki refused to appear before the investigating committee, appointed by the French boxing federation which held its first session today in an attempt to clear up the Carpenter-Siki frame-up charges.

The Senegalese through his counsel sent a letter to the committee saying that inasmuch as the federation had already taken away from him his license and title of champion without giving him a hearing, thus placing him under the necessity of suing them before the courts, he failed to see why they should ask to hear him now; it might cause prejudice to the legal action which would be heard by a tribunal.
