#### I. C. Evans Issues Warrant For C. A. Hazelrigg

I. C. Evans who recently had six hives of bees stolen from the Hazelrigg farm four miles north of Decatur found his bees or all that were left of them Monday. They were lo-cated in the Illinois river bottom ten miles west of Winchester and thirty miles southwest of Jacksonville Three of the colonies were dead, having; been smothered in moving or drowned in; the honey. The other three colonies were alive and working beautifully.

The three dead colonies had had the combs and honey cut from the frames. Two of the empty hives and supers all that the automobile would hold, were brought back to Decatur. After the return of Mr. Evans and the detectives to Decatur a warrant was sworn out for C. A. Hazelrigg charging him with stealing the been.

MOVED 125 MILES

The location of the been 125 miles from the place where they were stolen was not so difficult once the right end of the thread was picked up. The main apiary but were in an outyard on the Hazelrigg farm on the Bloomington road. They were presumably stolen on the night of Aug. 16. Mr. Evans did not learn of it till a week later when he visited the aplary. The Bloomington road during this time was closed for olling.


Mr. and Mrs. Hazelrigg claimed to have been away from home at the time of the theft and it was learned in the neighborhood that they had gone in a truck instead of the automobile which they usually take. It was also found that they had relatives at Winchester. Starting early Monday morning Mr. Evans and the detectives drove to Winchester, There they found a brother of C. A. Hazelrigg and other rela-

tives. They are all highly spected people. They learned that C. A. Hazelring had visited Winchester and that he had gone to the home of a brother-in-law, a man named Smuthers who lives in the river bot tom ten miles further west. They drove to the Smuthers place. They found the river bottome swarming with bees some of which Mr. Evans was sure were his.

FIND THE BEES They stopped at the Smuthers house for a drink of water. They found him a frank and straight forward They were shown the bees which he said had been left there by his brother-in-law, C. A. Hazelrigg. There was nothing that might arouse Smuthers' suspicious in this since the river bottom is a fine place for bees at this season of the year because of the abundance of smartwend. Mr. Evans identified the hives as his and told Smuthers what they should find written on the board under the cover. The empty hives were found stored overhead in the barn.

What had happened to the bees in moving was plain. The hives were toaded with honey and the weather was not. The entrance to the hives had heen carefully closed by strips of iath in which a series of saw cuts had been made for ventilation. The and the heat had melted the honey. which ran down over the bees. The colonies which escaped smothering were not so heavily laden with

The Hazelriggs have for several years been conducting a truck and fruit farm north of Decatur and are well known in the community. They also operated a radiator repair shop on East William street. He stated
